2. Programme Summary

The MA Education is an intensive programme that provides education professionals, or aspiring professionals, with a foundation in advanced educational studies.

The programme structure has been designed to encompass education in all its forms, from formal and professional learning and training to compulsory education. You will have the opportunity to meaningfully contextualise learning within your own area of practice or interest. As an academic qualification, the MA Education is seen as a means to develop knowledge, skills and understanding around contemporary issues of relevance to the field. It is also a vehicle for professional development and you will be encouraged, through your

assignments, to actively reflect upon your own practice (or anticipated area of practice) and how it impacts on learning.

Your active engagement with this course will provide you with opportunities to learn from education experts and peers. You will participate actively, too, in sharing your own knowledge, experience and practice as you engage purposefully with a range of topics. As part of your engagement with the programme, you will explore theories of learning and teaching, current issues in education and educational research methods. You will also carry out an extended independent research project relevant to your specific area of practice and/or interest.

Every aspect of the programme is designed to support the enhancement of both your practice and your developing identity as an education professional: we are excited to see what you will bring to the programme.

International applicants require a copy of their IELTS qualification, which should be at an overall score of 6.5 with no element below a 6.0, or other certificated proof of English proficiency as detailed here: <https://bucks.ac.uk/applying-to-bucks/general-entry-requirements>. Please note that as well as meeting University expectations in English competency, the discussion-based nature of workshops and oral assessments require students to have confidence in their spoken ability in order to participate fully in the programme.

Applicants should also note that because of the intensive nature of this full-time, attendance-based course of study, this programme is not compatible with full time work.

6. Learning, Teaching and Assessment

Learning and teaching

As both an academic qualification and a programme to support professional development, teaching approaches adopted throughout will be varied to model strategies that you can apply in your own practice. Technology-based approaches will be used to facilitate engagement in a combination of lectures and seminar-style activities. In all cases, the use of a virtual learning environment will offer asynchronous online activities as part of your guided independent study.

The use of discussion-based learning features particularly as a way of enabling you to share your practice. This provides a space for you to interpret module content as it applies to your own context or area of interest, and encourages you to develop your identity and practice.

Tutorials may be individual or offered on a group basis. These will support you in your progress and capture your development against professional goals and relevant professional competencies, knowledge and values relevant to your interests. These will also provide you with opportunities to negotiate your assessments in order to maximise their impact in supporting your career aspirations.

Assessment

The assessment strategy has been carefully crafted to ensure ample opportunities for formative feedback: we understand that all our students arrive with different academic experiences. Whether you are returning to study after a prolonged gap in academic work, are working to continue to enhance your English or want to make sure that you stretch yourself to a top end outcome, the embedding of developmental work will ensure you achieve your best.

A range of summative assessment approaches are used, and these are aligned to the aims of each of the modules. Assessment strategies are designed to provide opportunities to evidence your effective practice and professional development against relevant professional frameworks. Assessments include extended reflective writing for the purposes of evidencing professional practice. Other assessments include practical and oral assessment, such as observed teaching session.

The focus of your engagement with the assessment process will be negotiated with member of the academic course team. This will ensure that assessed work both meets your interests and needs as well as evidencing the programme learning outcomes.

Contact Hours

Each module includes workshops that include lectures, seminars, online activities, workshops and tutorials. The nature of applied postgraduate study means that you will also be asked to engage with aspects of your learning in a relevant professional context. These workshops are complemented with guided reading, tutorial support, asynchronous learning opportunities, and independent study.
