## 2. Programme Summary

Digital technologies are having a continuing impact on the performing arts. The next generation of innovation will continue to offer creative opportunities and some even greater challenges to actors and performing artists as they bring their work to the media production industry. This course offers a pathway into this fast-changing world by looking at how established principles and techniques can adapt to the digital world, and how new approaches can shape the future.

Perhaps you are a new graduate in Acting or Performing Arts, wanting to specialise in digital performance. Perhaps you are an established professional looking for the tools to navigate this brave new world. If so, this could be the course for you.

You will explore the application of established acting and performance skills in a digital context. You will view performance as both an ancient expressive art form, and also as an absorbent creative practice that can accommodate a wide range of technological innovations. You will gain hands-on experience with the latest equipment and processes, allowing you to explore the full range of audio, screen, audio and performance capture possibilities and their multiple applications.

You will work practically with established industry professionals and researcher-practitioners who will bring the latest knowledge into the course. You will explore what it means to perform in a range of mediated contexts, particularly looking at the shifting relationship between role you are playing and your personal identity. We also explore creative practice in a range of recent and emerging production contexts, investigating the evolving relationships between performers, directors and designers. We also affirm the empowerment that technical knowledge can offer the individual performer. The course culminates in the creation of both a group, and a solo original project where you can put into practice the skills and ideas you have acquired.

The course bridges the gap between undergraduate courses in performance and the advanced skills needed for a career in the digital creative industries. It also offers a range of transferable skills that can be applied to other contexts beyond conventional notions of the performing arts, particularly those industries that utilise screen media more broadly, recorded sound, presentation, performance, collaboration and leadership. It will appeal to acting and performing arts graduates interested in expanding their skill set as well as media graduates with an existing foundation in performance. It will provide additional skills and specialisms for those without a first degree in performance fields who are already engaged in the industry as performance professionals.

### 3. Programme Aims and Learning Outcomes

#### Programme Aims

This programme aims to:

1. Develop learners as mature, creative performing artists with a comprehensive understanding of mediated performance within the UK performing arts industry.
2. Develop learners' practical skills within the field of digital performance through an engagement with a wide range of creative and technical performance practice.
3. Encourage sophisticated critical awareness and analysis of the theoretical, political and ethical context of the current and emerging digital performance field.
4. Facilitate learners' personal and professional development as performing artists through simulation of and engagement with industry practice in their own creative work.
5. Prepare learners for employment by developing and consolidating a wide range of creative, technical, leadership and collaborative skills.

### Graduate Attributes

The BNU Graduate Attributes of: Knowledge and its application; Creativity; Social and ethical awareness and responsibility; and Leadership and self-development focus on the

development of innovative leaders in professional and creative capacities, who are equipped to operate in the 21st Century labour market and make a positive impact as global citizens.

On this programme, attributes are developed through the practical application of creative performance techniques within the specific context of digital performance as both audio and video output. Modules build knowledge in both established and emerging practice for digital performance and focus on the synthesis of existing knowledge and key innovations in current practice (K1-3).

Access to professional practitioners through intensive workshops offers an immersive experience of applied creative development in core performance practice as applied to digital media. Creative group projects address ethical and creative problem-solving within specific performance contexts (P1, P2, P3, T1, T3). Leadership and self-development are enhanced by this experience and then developed further through the creation of semi-independent group and individual productions, both of which demand highly refined levels of contextual and theoretical understanding and the ability to evaluate established practice in the context of new/emerging technology. particularly in relation to (C2, C3, P2, P4, T2).

Engagement with industry professionals and relevant technology ensures currency, boosts the learners' cultural capital and ensures that they exit the course with a rigorous experience of the creative opportunities and ethical challenges inherent in digital performance, and the confidence to apply their attainment in professional contexts K3, C3, P2, T2, T4, T5).

## 4. Entry Requirements

The University's [general entry requirements](#) will apply to admission to this programme with the following additions / exceptions:

- Typically 2:1 or above in an Acting or Performing Arts related field, and/or experience in the performing arts or media sector (in its widest sense, from performance to audio/video production, teaching and leadership).
- All learners will be required to attend an interview and give a presentation on their relevant experience. A showreel and/or audition workshop will also be required to ensure that learners have the requisite performance skills to be able to access the course successfully. Learners will be required to work to a high level in both practical and academic work.
- We welcome applicants from a range of backgrounds and experiences and are prepared to consider learners with relevant experience in addition to the above typical profile.

If you do not meet the entry requirements you may, if you have relevant professional experience, still be invited for interview, where you will be required to demonstrate the necessary knowledge and understanding for entry onto the course.

Previous study, professional and / or vocational experiences may be recognised as the equivalent learning experience and permit exemption from studying certain modules in accordance with our [accreditation of prior learning](#) (APL) process.

## 6. Learning, Teaching and Assessment

### Learning and teaching:

The interplay of innovative practice and critical theory is a hallmark of the approach to learning on this master's programme. Learners are offered a range of practice-based experiences placed into their theoretical, social and ethical context, to generate a robust engagement with both the reflective and practical elements of performance making in novel contexts.

Contact with professional practice and emerging technology is a key feature of the postgraduate experience and we enable this by drawing on the input of industry professionals in acting skills for the Acting for Digital Media module, and new media specialists for both Digital Production Skills and Creative Explorations in New Technologies. The latter is delivered as an intensive workshop series synthesising performance skills and technical knowledge.

Elsewhere the teaching recognises that at master's level the learner will become progressively independent as their knowledge and confidence grows. In the later stages of the programme teaching become more individualised, with tutors offering one-to-one input on creative and academic work-in-progress.

### Assessment:

The MA draws on a wide range of assessment tools, as recommended in the QAA Master's Degree Characteristics Statement. For example:

### Contact Hours:

- The exception is the dissertation module which is designed around the requirement to support independent postgraduate study. In this case the contact hours are fewer but focussed on one-to-one tutorial and supervision support.
