2. Programme Summary

This programme provides you with a wide range of technical and creative skills for a career in the film and media industries. You will be taught on cutting edge and industry standard equipment in our studios and edit suites at High Wycombe, and in our base at Pinewood Studios, by tutors who are experienced industry professionals and media practitioners. In the first year, you are introduced to a range of uses of cameras, sound kit, lighting, and

editing software. You study documentary and fiction scripting and filmmaking, gaining pre-production and production knowledge, including directing. Your skills are put into practice through short films and scripts, and an end of year production. You will also analyse screen styles and apply critical ideas to film and television.

In your second year, you will build on the skills acquired at level 4 gaining advanced technical and creative skills, including on cameras, lighting and industry-standard editing and post-production software. You may study virtual production technology. There are opportunities to create films to briefs for external clients, or a music video for a band or musician, as well as experimental films. You may learn the employable skills of live events production, including multi-camera operator and floor manager, whether for live music, or studio-based discussion programmes, or advanced script writing for fiction production. For the third year dissertation, learners choose between a creative production, a project in screenwriting or a written industry study. Additionally the third year is the time to advance your virtual production skills, or create original short films, or investigative documentaries. You will also gain key skills in employability, and in social media content, to help you to build a professional career.

On the programme, you have the opportunity to choose from two pathways, Film Production or Film and Television Production. Both offer a range of choices, but on Film Production, all learners study virtual production in the second and third year, while on Film and Television Production all learners study live events and multi-camera in the second and third year, working to professional standards of live television production, and collaborating with clients. On Film and Television Production you will learn genre studies, with a focus on fantasy and science fiction. On Film Production in the third year you may study directing skills, including specialist cameras. Both pathways offer collaboration with learners on other creative degrees, and opportunities to work on client briefs, reflecting industry practice. Throughout the programme, you will be taught expert skills to enhance your creativity and professionalism, towards your industry career.

1. Develop practical production skills and knowledge, for example in camera, lighting and editing, that are relevant to a range of practices and formats, with an emphasis on multi-skilled graduates
2. Facilitate creativity, originality and problem-solving in the application of knowledge and skills to produce cutting-edge creative artefacts
3. Engender the ability to research, critically evaluate and analyse film, television and media texts, the film and media industries and technological developments
4. Provide opportunities for learners to gain a high level of production teamwork skills and to balance self-direction, vision and communication when working professionally within a team
5. Produce critically-aware professionals who understand existing and emerging forms of media and technologies and are versatile in responding to the needs of the industry

On this programme, attributes are developed through the study of a range of technical and creative skills. Industry-relevant knowledge and understanding are gained by studying techniques and skills in using cameras, lighting, editing, post-production software, sound and virtual production technologies, as well as screenwriting. Understanding is gained of pre-production, production and post-production, of diverse forms including fiction, documentary and art film, and of industry standards and regulations. Key styles, genres and narratives in cinema and media are studied, underpinning production with critical knowledge (K1-4, C1-2) Learners creatively apply studies to produce films, scripts and media, demonstrating skills and innovation. They prepare analytical assignments, creatively applying research and analysis (C3-5, P1-4, T3). Collaborative productions reflecting industry practice include

opportunities to work on client briefs, and live multi-camera. Leadership is facilitated in group productions, and by studying roles such as directing. Self-reflection, self-development and responsibility for one's own learning are enabled through many areas of the programme. There are opportunities to develop film and media skills in high demand for a range of industry careers as well as communication and entrepreneurship (P5, T2), while the course also facilitates inclusive, ethically aware professionals (T1, T4).

4. Entry Requirements

The University's [general entry requirements](#) will apply to admission to this programme.

The course is aimed primarily at those who have successfully completed A levels, a National Diploma or similar and have a desire to work within creative industries in the context of film, television or streaming production. Applicants are expected to show a keen interest in film for BA (Hons) Film Production and an interest in film and television/ streaming for the Film and Television pathway. You will be expected to have an eye for the visual image and storytelling, demonstrated through creative projects that you have attempted. Good written and verbal communication skills are also essential with a good command of English language and IT skills. If your background is in subjects not related to film or television, we encourage you to apply, and to contact the Course Leader to discuss your interest in this area of study.

Applicants who do not meet the minimum requirements for the 3-year programme, or those who do not feel fully prepared for a Level 4 course, will be considered for the 4-year programme including a Foundation Year.

Previous study, professional and / or vocational experiences may be recognised as the equivalent learning experience and permit exemption from studying certain modules in accordance with our [accreditation of prior learning](#) (APL) process. If you do not meet the entry requirements you may, if you have relevant professional experience, be invited for interview, where you will be required to demonstrate the necessary knowledge and understanding for entry onto the course.

6. Learning, Teaching and Assessment

Learning and teaching

Learning and teaching takes place in person. Our approaches correspond to sections 6.1 to 6.6 of the Communication, Media, Film and Cultural Studies QAA benchmarks.

The objective is to develop you as an independent, critical thinkers with professional filmmaking or film and television production skills. To achieve this a selection of lectures, master classes, seminars, and workshops are provided along with a supplementary selection of online learning resources. The course makes use of contact hours in a variety of ways.

1. Lectures, which inform and develop subject-specific knowledge and understanding.
2. Demonstrations and workshops, which will develop proficiency in the utilisation of production and post-production equipment for camera operation, lighting, recording of sound and editing filmic content.
3. Work simulations, live projects, client productions and work experience that will develop your knowledge and skills for employability.
4. Group seminars and tutorials during which key theories and contemporary issues will be discussed and you will develop your capacity to reflect critically on film and media.
5. Group project work that will provide you with the opportunities to further develop your production skills and to experiment with the medium.
6. Individual tutorials that will provide support and guidance dependent upon your needs and career aspirations
7. Use of a range of technology systems for the progressive acquisition of production skills that will prepare you for the technologically challenging work environment
8. Guided viewing on Box of Broadcasts and short screenings that will broaden your experience and further develop the conceptual and critical understanding of moving image forms.
9. Delivery of course content is complemented by contributions from industry professionals such as scriptwriters, directors, producers, editors and camera operators, and from those in new media distribution, interactive media and transmedia.
10. Your studies will be supported by a wide range of production and post-production resources, by Blackboard our VLE, digital reading lists, e-books and where relevant, video conferencing on Blackboard Collaborate Ultra.

In the first year, you will gain key skills. In production-oriented modules contact hours are initially dedicated to developing your skills in the use of equipment through practical demonstration and through experimentation that is guided and supported by a tutor.

In the second year, you will be able to select from options in modules that will help you to build your employability. As your skills develop the mode of study evolves towards individual and group productions being undertaken more independently with occasional but carefully

targeted tutorial support. Your guided independent study includes level-appropriate access to equipment outside sessions, to enhance your skills.

In your final year, you will also be able to select from options, including a final project that you will plan and will work independently with tutorial support.

Assessment

The following assessment activities are used on this programme:

1. Group and individual portfolios of written work and audio-visual content that may include research, pre-production, production and post-production work submissions
2. Critical self-evaluation and role analysis in the form of individual reflective written evaluations.
3. Opportunity for client briefs, external placement/work-based learning reports that will enhance each learner's capacity to adopt professional working practices.
4. Tasks and projects aimed at the assessment of specific production skills which will target each individual's career aspirations.
5. Individual and group oral presentations with logs.
6. Film and media essays and textual analyses that are culturally, industrially and technologically contextualised.
7. Exercises conveying critical understanding through practice.
8. Self-evaluation through external industry professional feedback on their production work.

Academic Progression

During the Foundation Year, learners will be exposed to a variety of summative and formative assessments whilst developing the academic skills to be a successful learner at university; course content and Learning Outcomes strongly relate to learners developing their knowledge and understanding of the subjects being studied and assessed.

Levels 4 and 5 focus on the development of technical and analytical skills. Your assessment will mainly be based on portfolio work including practical filmmaking and screenwriting exercises, and a group production project. These assessments form the basis for work at Level 5 and 6. For example, short group presentations are included in the portfolio Production Skills with Analysis 2 and will provide skills for further presentations in modules at Level 5 and Level 6.

At Levels 5 and 6, assessments include practical exercises, assessment of film or media sequences, live shoots, screenplays and finished productions, with related production paperwork, including reports. Depending on your option modules, you may choose to create films to client briefs for outside agencies, or for musicians. Level 6 modules focus on more self-management and entrepreneurial skills and elements that will duly prepare you for a

largely freelance workplace. The option Professional Preparation enables you to choose to be assessed on client-based production, or vocational experience.

Aligned with this, you will be introduced in some sessions for the combined Production Skills with Analysis modules at Level 4 to critical study of film and media, and to methods by which you might theorize your predominantly practical work and contextualize this through academic rigor. This is enhanced at Level 5, including evaluations that accompany practical assignments, or in the core Advanced Single Camera with Analysis module and Film Drama: Production and Analysis option module, and at Level 6 in the dissertation paperwork that accompanies your practical screenwriting or filmmaking project, or in the Industry Practice Research Project.

Contact Hours

You will be studying 120 credits (1200 hours) per year of the programme. Your learning will involve a mixture of scheduled learning and teaching activities and guided independent study. Learners can expect to receive approximately twelve hours of scheduled learning activities per week. A full breakdown of contact hours can be found in individual module descriptors.
