## 2. Programme Summary

This British Psychological Society (BPS) accredited programme is designed to enable you to combine studying the core approaches to contemporary psychology with a choice of applied and theoretical areas. Psychology is a broad and fascinating discipline, and the course will provide you with a scientific understanding of this diverse topic, from the ‘hidden’ aspects of human behaviour (i.e. how our brain and biological mechanisms support different functions), to those we see in everyday life (e.g. social phenomena such as crime or relationships). This interaction between the brain, body, and the environment is at the very heart of what you will study with us at Buckinghamshire New University.

This is a highly interactive course which will give you hands on practical experience throughout. Our teaching and learning methods will cover a wide range of activities, including interactive lectures, seminars, and workshops, in which you will be encouraged to actively participate. The understanding you develop will be evaluated throughout your degree programme via a broad variety of assessment methods, including quizzes, written documents i.e. essays, reports, exams, and presentations both oral and poster. As you progress through your course you will have the opportunity to choose from different pathways depending on your area of interest. In your final year you will build on the skills developed in previous years, culminating in an independent research project, which allows you to focus on your chosen area of interest.

The programme will not only help you to develop specific knowledge in your area of interest but will also provide you with a variety of other skills, such as how to critically evaluate and present information and data. Upon graduation you will be equipped with an impressive variety of transferable skills that will help to enhance future employability in a wide range of careers, both subject specific and in the broader sector, from teaching to forensics, local government to counselling and much more.

Students studying the pathways of Forensic Psychology and Counselling Psychotherapy will be required to complete a Disclosure and Barring Services (DBS) check due to the placement modules within these courses. A flag on a DBS check does not mean a student will not be able to study on the programme but it may limit the type of placement available.

If you do not meet the entry requirements you may, if you have relevant professional experience, still be invited for interview, where you will be required to demonstrate the necessary knowledge and understanding for entry onto the course.

Previous study, professional and / or vocational experiences may be recognised as the equivalent learning experience and permit exemption from studying certain modules in accordance with our [accreditation of prior learning](#) (APL) process.

## 6. Learning, Teaching and Assessment

### Learning and teaching

The learning and teaching strategy across the programme draws upon a range of approaches to learning including lectures, seminars, workshops, practical classes, role-play, and problem-based learning. These are adopted in different ways across levels of study and across modules as appropriate to module content. For example, at Level 4, a mixture of lectures, seminars, debates, and problem-based learning allows new concepts to be introduced and then explored in relation to real-world applications. As learners progress through Levels 5 and 6, an increasing use of workshop teaching supports more discursive approaches to learning.

Similarly, specific topics such as psychological research methods, which learners often find challenging, benefit from a cumulative teaching approach, introducing, and reinforcing concepts across the module with an emphasis placed on embedding principles in relatable contexts.

Learners are supported by use of a university VLE that allows communication outside of scheduled sessions (e.g., via discussion boards) and sharing of resources.

### Assessment

The assessment strategy across the programme means that learners experience a breadth of assessment techniques, ranging between written assignments (such as traditional academic essays and research reports), exams, oral presentations, poster presentations, and portfolios. Assessments are designed to develop key academic skills, develop ways of communicating in a professional manner, and evidence learning in different ways.

Portfolio assessments are included at all levels of the programme to offer flexible and inclusive forms of assessment. Such assessments allow learners to evidence their learning over the duration of the module.

### Contact Hours

For any 20-credit module on this programme, there are 200 notional learning hours that include approximately 60 hours of scheduled learning activities. These may include 'synchronous' activities such as lectures, seminars, workshops, practical classes, tutorials or asynchronous activities such as guided learning activities. A full breakdown of contact hours can be found in individual module descriptors.

## 7. Programme Regulations

This programme will be subject to the following assessment regulations:

- PSY6001 Psychology Undergraduate Dissertation cannot be condoned. The British Psychological Society places an obligation on universities and students to conduct research ethically. A primary measure of the ability to conduct ethical research is passing the empirical dissertation.
