## 2. Programme Summary

The BSc (Hons) Professional Nursing Practice (Top up) degree programme enables nurses to access development opportunities and academic accreditation from the programme. This programme is carefully designed to support nurses in advancing their careers, providing a clear pathway toward specialist nurse, clinical educator, leadership including ward or clinical area management, community and public health roles. It acknowledges and builds upon the extensive experience and knowledge gained through nursing practice. The course is open to both UK-based and international nurses, including internationally educated nurses currently working in the UK. Delivered through flexible, part-time distance learning, it offers an accessible opportunity for nurses to enhance their existing qualifications and achieve a

degree with honours. The programme is an internationally recognised qualification, cultivating critical thinking and problem-solving abilities while enhancing cross-cultural competence for practice in diverse healthcare environments.

The programme empowers nurses to critically engage with global healthcare perspectives, fostering a nuanced understanding of international systems, policies, and cultural contexts. Through advanced analysis of diverse practices and complex global challenges, learners develop the ability to synthesise evidence, evaluate global innovations, and apply strategic insights to enhance care delivery, including through technological advancements, support digital health literacy and prioritise person-centred care. This global outlook not only strengthens professional identity but also equips nurses to lead and influence within increasingly interconnected and multicultural healthcare environments.

The programme reflects the WHO Global Strategic Directions for Nursing and Midwifery 2021–2025, which emphasise the importance of:

- Strengthening nursing education and training,
- Promoting leadership at all levels of healthcare,
- Enhancing evidence-based practice,

## Graduate Attributes

The BNU Graduate Attributes of: Knowledge and its application; Creativity; Social and ethical awareness and responsibility; and Leadership and self-development focus on the development of innovative leaders in professional and creative capacities, who are equipped to operate in the 21st Century labour market and make a positive impact as global citizens.

On this programme, attributes are developed through the acquisition and application of knowledge critical to nursing care (K1, K2, T2). This knowledge and understanding will relate to a range of relevant topics including evidence-based practice, key clinical issues, global health issues, leadership and management and innovation for healthcare to support and challenge current nursing care (K3, K4, T2, T4). Learners throughout the programme will demonstrate self-direction for their learning, and access support appropriately (T3, T5) while independently managing their engagement with a range of asynchronous resources.

Learners develop knowledge of subjects through review and critical exploration of the evidence base linked to the topic being studied (C1, C2). Evidenced-based practice, technology, national guidelines and research are linked to enable learners to understand factors contributing to the development, implementation and evaluation of clinical practice (T4).

Reflection on practice and through the understanding and exploration of common global issues in healthcare allows learners to synthesise contemporary initiatives into current professional nursing practice, demonstrating their ability to critically evaluate nursing practice (K2, C1, P2, P3, P4). By developing their confidence in interpreting evidence, and communicating findings, learners will feel able to work with others to address contemporary health issues and contribute meaningfully to improving professional practice through recommendations for innovation (P2, P5, T1, T4). This is achieved throughout the modules and culminates in completion of a Dissertation: Extended Literature Review focussed on a selected area of practice (P1, C3, C4).

The programme utilises a variety of approaches to support learning, appropriate to a degree award and distance learning including: synchronous sessions covering key concepts relevant to each module, utilising learner experience from nursing practice, pre-recorded videos (with closed captions), appropriate short videos (with closed captions), slide sets, research and commentary articles, web links, podcasts (audio), ebook chapters, quizzes, case scenarios.

## 4. Entry Requirements

The University's [general entry requirements](#) will apply to admission to this programme with the following additions:

- Learners must be a registered nurse
- Learners must be working in a practice-based nursing role
- Hold a Diploma of Higher Education or equivalent including 120 credits at Level 4 and Level 5

Learners with international nursing qualifications, will have the academic level of their qualifications assessed by the UK ENIC (or equivalent).

If you do not meet the entry requirements you may, if you have relevant professional experience, still be invited for interview, where you will be required to demonstrate the necessary knowledge and understanding for entry onto the course.

If learners have completed the module 'Developing a Portfolio for Accreditation of Prior Experiential Learning' at BNU, they will be able to gain entry to the programme via a group directive, confirmed by the University's APL panel.

Previous study, professional and / or vocational experiences may be recognised as the equivalent learning experience and permit exemption from studying certain modules in accordance with our [accreditation of prior learning](#) (APL) process.

## 6. Learning, Teaching and Assessment

### Learning and teaching

Paramount to the teaching and learning strategy will be the value placed on the learners own individual experience and workplace. This aligns with adult learning theory, emphasising the link between professional experience, linking theoretical underpinnings of health and social care delivery ensuring relevance to the students' role and specialty through application of analysis, synthesis and professional judgement. A varied programme of learning and teaching strategies enables the learner to achieve an award whatever their professional nursing role. Active learning is embedded across all modules, promoted through discussions to ensure student engagement, and through completion of self-directed learner focused elements across assessments.

**Lectures** (Synchronous and Asynchronous): keynote lectures will be employed to launch fundamental theoretical aspects of the programme and will provide the academic foundation for learner-led activity within seminars and/or workshops.

**Seminars:** seminars will offer a forum by which learners can explore key areas and will combine the presentation of information and ideas, exploration of relevant issues, and the application of theoretical principles. There will be further opportunities for them to discuss the application of these in their field of nursing practice.

**Case-based Discussion:** during synchronous sessions, a range of case studies will be used as a vehicle for enquiry-based learning. Learners will explore and critically discuss the components of those cases, to learn from successful and unsuccessful approaches as well as to be able to iterate the nature of good and bad experiences. The case studies will enable learners to illuminate the nature of work, and the demands inherent within nursing practice, leadership and innovation to enable the development of critical knowledge and problem-solving skills.

**Directed reading:** throughout the programme, learners will be required to engage in critical discussion, which will require them to undertake directed reading. They will be provided with relevant reading lists by the lecturers, and via the Virtual Learning Environment and will be encouraged to undertake independent reading to ensure they engage with a breadth of literature, evidence and activities, so they are cognisant of contemporary debates within a range of nursing fields/issues.

**Virtual Learning Environment (VLE):** Asynchronous learning and support will be provided through a range of approaches and materials which will include: pre-recorded lecture videos (with closed captions), appropriate short videos (with closed captions), slides, research and commentary articles, web links, podcasts (audio), ebook chapters, quizzes, case scenarios. Learners will participate in discussion boards for the individual modules to facilitate the sharing of information and engagement with asynchronous learning.

## Assessment

**Presentation:** Learners are supported to develop their presentation skills with presentations assessed by the tutor using a clear marking scheme. Presentations will include an exploration of their own leadership style based on colleague feedback.

**Essay/Report:** a variety of written assessments are used ranging from reflection on individually identified elements of nursing practice, to reports and the development of portfolios and education tools for colleagues, developed from critique of practice and evidence.

**Engagement with the VLE -** Engagement with the VLE will foster scholarly debate, resource sharing, and collaborative reflection. Students will participate in a variety of online activities and discussion forums, followed by a concise reflective summary of their engagement.

**Literature review:** A review of literature is used as part of the summative assessment. This allows the students to explore in greater depth a subject of their choice utilising a range of evidence leading to a greater understanding of the topic and also promotes recommendations for evidence-based practice innovations.

**Extended Literature Review:** an evidence-based work-related project will be completed in the final stages of the programme. This allows the student to identify an area of clinical interest and relevance to their nursing role and produce an extended piece of work resulting in recommendations for innovation in practice.

**Formative assessment:** elements of formative assessment are included in all modules so learners can prepare for the summative assessments and identify any gaps in their knowledge/approach to the assessment through developmental feedback.

## Contact Hours

Each year of the BSc (Hons) Professional Nursing Practice (Top up) consists of 60 credits, therefore 600 hours of scheduled learning activities (synchronous and asynchronous) and independent study. For 20-credit modules, learners can expect to receive approximately 3 hours of synchronous contact for scheduled learning activities per week, for 9 weeks. In addition, there will be approximately 30 hours of identified asynchronous activities for each 20-credit module. A full breakdown of contact hours can be found in individual module descriptors.
